Major Events

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Preliminary meeting with P&O facility in Papua New Guinea

Dr. Friedbert Kohler, Outreach Committee Member and Rehabilitation Physician at Braeside Hospital and Lecturer in the School of Public Health and Community Medicine at the University of UNSW, has recently visited the National Orthotic and Prosthetic Service (NOPS) in PNG.

Some time ago, Mr. Rajesh Nanda, the manager of NOPS contacted ISPO to determine if any assistance, especially in training, could be provided. Mr. Nanda manages the NOPS from its headquarters in Lae.

Dr. Kohler and ISPO Outreach determined that a preliminary visit would be a useful step. Dr. Kohler was able to fund his trip with assistance from Hope Healthcare which manages three affiliated public hospitals in NSW, including Braeside hospital.

During his trip, Dr. Kohler prepared a report that provides an overview of the structure of P&O service provision in PNG, and outlines key demographic and organisational data. The services in PNG are very intensive, with over one thousand clients per year.

Currently, some 17 people work in the Lae facility. Only the manager has any formal training in prosthetics and orthotics. The remainder have been trained on the job. A few have been able to travel to Japan for short term training courses, but Dr. Kohler has noted that at the present rate of training, it would take nearly a decade to train just half of the team in this way.

Among his draft recommendations, Dr. Kohler has suggested additional and ongoing training both in-country and formal training internationally. There is, at present, no training facility in PNG.

"The state of the health care system generally in PNG is severely under-resourced and increasingly heavily focussed on HIV/AIDS care and prevention", Dr. Kohler noted. This, and a background of underdeveloped allied health care is a very large challenge for the stakeholders, and potentially for this society.

Dr. Kohler and the outreach committee will continue to work with Mr. Nanda toward providing better services for our 5 million nearest neighbours in PNG.

Perth 2006 ASM: Further Developments

Ms. Sandy Crameri and the 2006 convening committee have been working hard on preparing the 2006 ASM.

"The major theme of '*Patient Problems & Practicalities*' - *Solving Clinical Issues in Patient Management*' is clinically based and should encourage the submission of case studies by clinicians" Sandy said.

"We look forward to making a first announcement at the Sydney ASM in November", Sandy added.

The ASM will be held from the 12th-14th October 2006 Esplanade Hotel in Fremantle. The ARATA conference will be held from the 20th at the same venue, meaning there will be opportunities for members of both organisations to meet in sunny Perth.

The International Society for Prosthetics and Orthotics (ISPO), is a multi-disciplinary organization comprised of persons who have a professional interest in the clinical, educational and research aspects of prosthetics, orthotics, rehabilitation engineering and related topics.

ISPO was founded in Copenhagen, Denmark in 1970 by a group of surgeons, prosthetist-orthotists, physiotherapists, occupational therapists and engineers to promote improvements in the care of all persons with neuromuscular and skeletal impairments.

ISPO presently has 2500 members worldwide in 75 countries. Where there are more than five members in any country, or region, they may band together to form a National or Regional Member Society. National Member Societies have been established in 28 countries.

As stated in the Society's Constitution, its basic aim is the promotion of high quality care. To achieve this:

- It acts as an international advisory body interacting with other international and national agencies, providing guidance and coordination and seeking to achieve the optimal use of resources;
- It acts as a vehicle for the exchange of information through such means as publication of its journal and the organisation of seminars, courses and conferences;
- It promotes and guides research, development and evaluation activities
- It encourages, supports and correlates education and training activities of all the professions in this field;
- It guides and supports the activities of those responsible for the care of patients;
- It undertakes projects to facilitate high-level uniform practice by such means as the development of adequate international standards.

The ISPO executive are pleased to report that the refurbished website is working well.

The website offers additional information, a members-only area and a user 's forum that will be deployed in coming months.

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Tungaru Rehabilitation Service - One year on...

The one year anniversary of the new Tungaru Rehabilitation Service in Kiribati will be in October. The service has continued to develop over the past 12 months and is becoming well known around the atolls of Kiribati.

The department has been providing various prosthetic and orthotic services, including trans-tibial and trans-femoral prosthetics (a total of 40 fabricated to date), cosmetic toes and fingers (all made on site), upper and lower limb orthoses, serial casting and fracture casting.

The department has continued with its preventative programs, including lunch time and after work exercise videos and circuit training for staff of the ministry of health. This has proven a popular service and community members from outside the ministry are also beginning to attend.

Recent additions to the service include the prosthetic & orthotic home visit program. The home visits are conducted fortnightly, in addition to the weekly physiotherapy home visits, to assess progress within the home environment and to increase the service provision to people who are unable to come to the service. Home visits have included, gait training, prosthetic/orthotic adjustments and assessments and casts for prosthetic candidates.

The number of clients attending for prosthetic/orthotic treatment has steadied over the past few months allowing more time for training and planning activities. Recently a weekly in-service afternoon was initiated within the rehabilitation service whereby all staff will be required to present. Intended subjects include various pathologies, fabrication, assessment and treatment processes from both the prosthetist/orthotists

and the physiotherapists.

Trainee prosthetists, Toare Toaneti and Tebakaro Aata have completed trans-tibial and trans-femoral theory and have now started lower limb orthotic theory. In addition to this they have been working through the Handicap International physical therapy training manuals along with our physiotherapy assistants. Prosthetic technician Mr. Alan Reiper visited for one month through the AVB program in May to provide further technical training to Toare and Tebakaro. They learned many technical skills and techniques from Alan that has ensured the production of high quality work. Their attendance at this years Annual Scientific Meeting in Sydney will allow them to develop their skills and knowledge even further.

Plans for further expansion of the service include outer island tours, more preventative workshops for various community groups and purchasing of a vehicle for the home visit programs. These plans however rely on support from the Ministry of Health in Kiribati and increases in budget provisions.

Overall the service has proven necessary for Kiribati and it can only continue to develop, raising the profile of rehabilitation both within the Ministry of Health and Medical Services and the Kiribati community.

The inception of this service was made possible by the efforts of the ISPO Outreach Committee, who developed initial funding proposals to the Canada Fund and to the Kiribati Ministry of Health.

These activities are made possible by many funding agencies and through the support of the wider membership of the ISPO ANMS.

This is the role of the Executive Committee. I strongly encourage all ISPO Australia members to think about contributing to the business-end of the organisation by serving as a committee member.

I have served on the ISPO Australia Executive for 15 years and have enjoyed my time immensely. However, it is time for me to move to other things and I will not re-nominate for any position this year, but will serve as Immediate Past President by default so I will be available to support the incoming executive. I hope many ISPO Australia members are keen to continue the essential work of the organisation and lead it into the future.

What time is involved?

The Executive Committee (EC) meets by teleconference 4 times per year. Each teleconference lasts about 1½ to 2 hours. The EC also meets face-to-face annually, for a meeting of around 3 hours duration. EC members generally sit on at least one sub-committee that meets 3-4 times each year for about an hour each time. All EC members undertake activity between meetings, such as writing letters, planning Educational courses, seeking sponsors, managing funds, developing Outreach projects, negotiating with other groups, editing news stories etc.

What does the EC do?

The EC works with the Outreach sub-committee to assess and select Outreach projects to undertake, works towards those projects, and often recruits additional people to work on projects. After receiving advice from the S&E subcommittee, the EC decides when and where each ISPO Annual Scientific Meeting or ISPO Course is held. It selects major themes and keynote speakers for each ASM or course. The EC liaises with the International ISPO Office on behalf of ISPO Australia members, and selects a person to represent ISPO Australia at International Committee Meetings. In terms of Finance, the EC manages ISPO Australia funds including investments and underwriting of Outreach projects and ASMs. Publications include a website and newsletter. Of course, the EC is also responsible for day-to-day running of ISPO Australia.

What roles do EC members have?

All EC members hold an Office or manage a sub-committee. Current EC roles include:

President, Secretary, Treasurer, Chair of Outreach, Chair of Science & Education, Annual Scientific Meeting Liaison Officer, Publicity Officer, Convenor of Annual Scientific Meeting, Website manager. Many of these roles involve close work with a sub-committee, which is made up of various people who have special interest in the area.

Who has served on the EC previously?

To reflect the multidisciplinary nature of ISPO, EC members have included Rehabilitation Specialists, Prosthetists, Occupational Therapists, Physiotherapists, Orthopaedic Surgeons, Orthotists, Bioengineers, Managers, Clinicians, Academics and others. Some members have been people with many years of experience in their speciality; other members have been new graduates in their profession. The EC typically includes people from many Australian states and territories, and men and women have been fairly equally involved.

Why have past members served on the EC?

Motivations have included a desire to contribute to an organisation that does outreach work in the P&O sphere; interest in developing Australian continuing education; interest in contributing to key decisions of the organisation; ambition to develop project management or leadership skills; and opportunities for networking with a multidisciplinary, national team. Many EC members serve for at least two terms (6 years total), indicating that they enjoy their experience on the committee and renominate for election.

Do EC members get paid?

No, all positions are voluntary. However, each EC member is entitled to funding for one economy domestic flight per year to attend a face-to-face EC meeting that is held outside their state of residence. EC members are rewarded by the experience they gain and by the knowledge that they have contributed to the activity of ISPO Australia.
